NCLA Endorses Amendment 47 *Three Chambers and NCEDC support endorsement*

NORTHERN COLORADO – The Northern Colorado Legislative Alliance officially endorsed Amendment 47, the Colorado Right to Work Amendment. NCLA’s member organizations, Fort Collins, Loveland and Greeley chambers of commerce and the Northern Colorado Economic Development Corporation, ratified NCLA’s support position and are supporting the pro-freedom ballot measure that will be on the statewide November ballot.

“After a thorough review of Amendment 47, it became clear that we should endorse it for the good of Colorado’s workers and its economy,” said Sandra Hagen Solin of the Northern Colorado Legislative Alliance. “It gives every worker in Colorado a fundamental freedom we all deserve, and it represents a needed component to get our economy moving in the right direction.”

Brian Willms, President of the Loveland Chamber of Commerce, added: “It’s very apparent that Amendment 47 will be on the ballot in November. After thoughtful discussion, it also became very apparent that we should endorse the measure. It’s pro-worker, it’s pro-business and it’s pro-economy. Our endorsement of Amendment 47 is an endorsement of a strong future for Colorado.”

Amendment 47 will ensure that no Coloradan can be forced to join a union or pay union dues as a condition of employment. However, it also preserves a worker’s right to voluntarily join a union.

The Amendment 47 campaign was proud to have earned the endorsement of all the Northern Colorado groups.

“This campaign is enjoying a huge surge in momentum just weeks prior to Election Day,” said campaign spokesman Kelley Harp. “We have been and remain confident that Colorado voters will understand what all these organizations understand – that passing Amendment 47 is vitally important to Colorado and all its citizens.”
